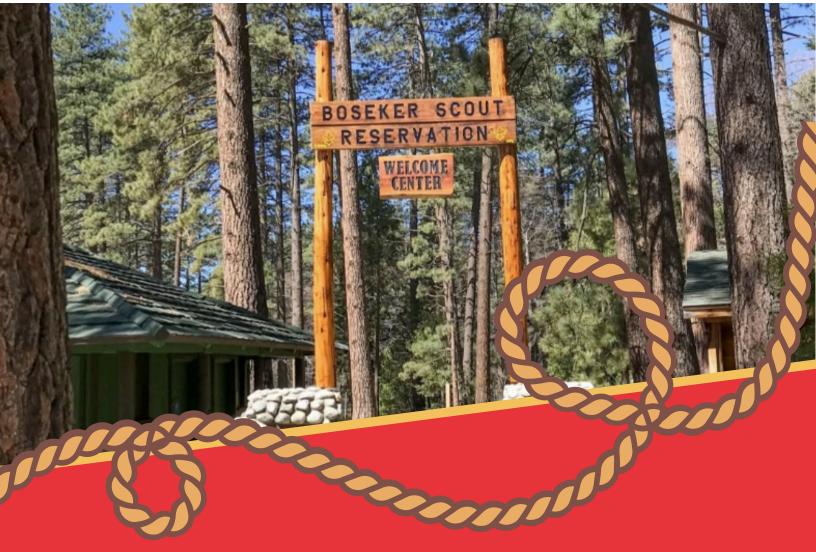




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# **WELCOME**

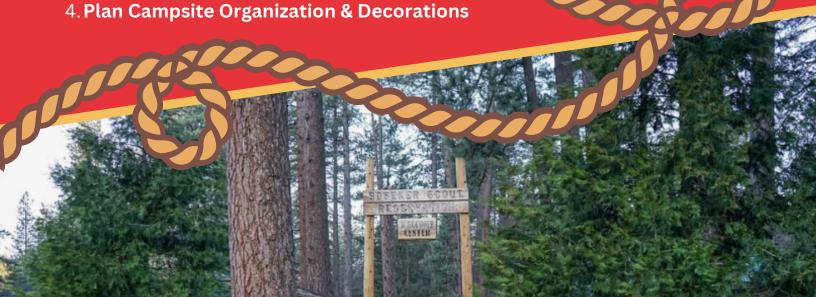

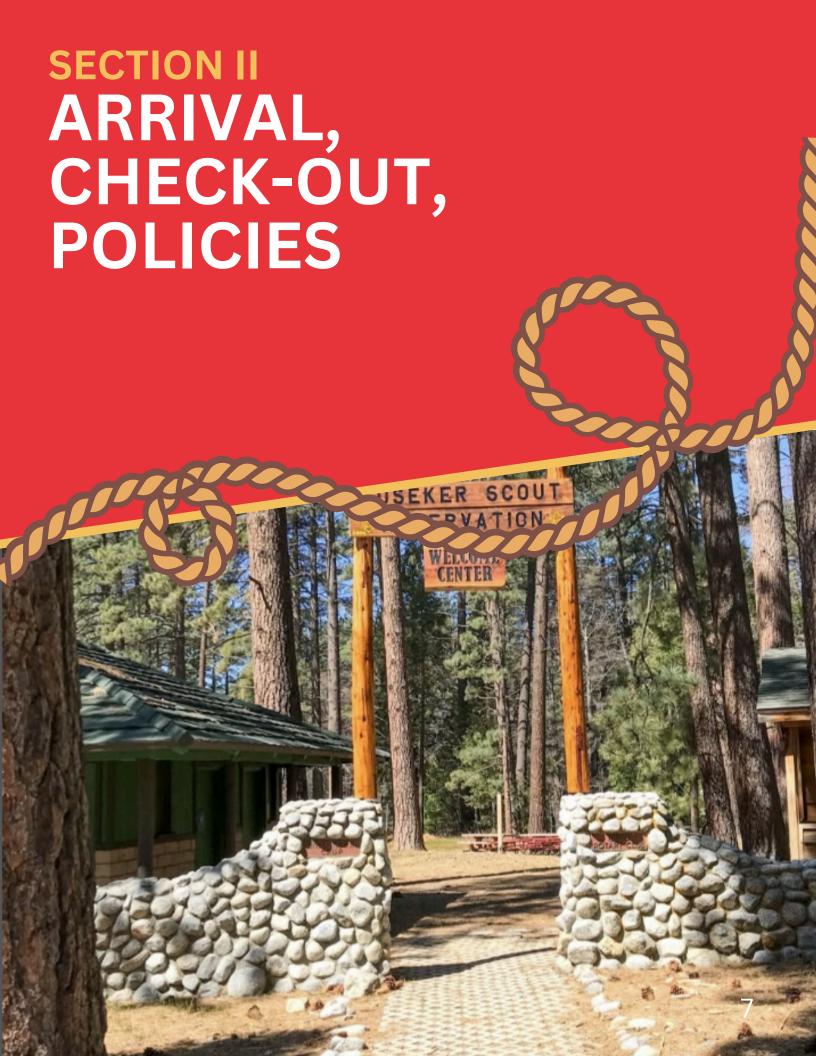


## WHAT YOU CANNOT BRING

## **CHECK-IN**

Camp Emerson is located at 53155 Idyllbrook Dr, Idyllwild, CA 92549.

Plan to carpool! When you arrive, please park in the lower parking lot at the pavilion, and **back into your parking spot**. Drivers should always keep their keys on them in case we have to quickly leave camp. Vehicles are not allowed in the camp!

The entire unit must be present at check-in. Please send one leader to check in at the pavilion with your paperwork. At check-in, you will receive your campsite assignment and a schedule of events.

At check in please provide your copies of:

- Unit Roster (1 Copy)
- Health & Medical Record part A & B for each participant including parents.
- Shooting Sports Authorization (1 copy)

Scouts BSA staff will be available to direct scouts to their campsites. Some of the campsites are a short distance from the gear drop off points and all parking is remote from the campsites, so wagons or handcarts can be useful to help move your unit's gear.

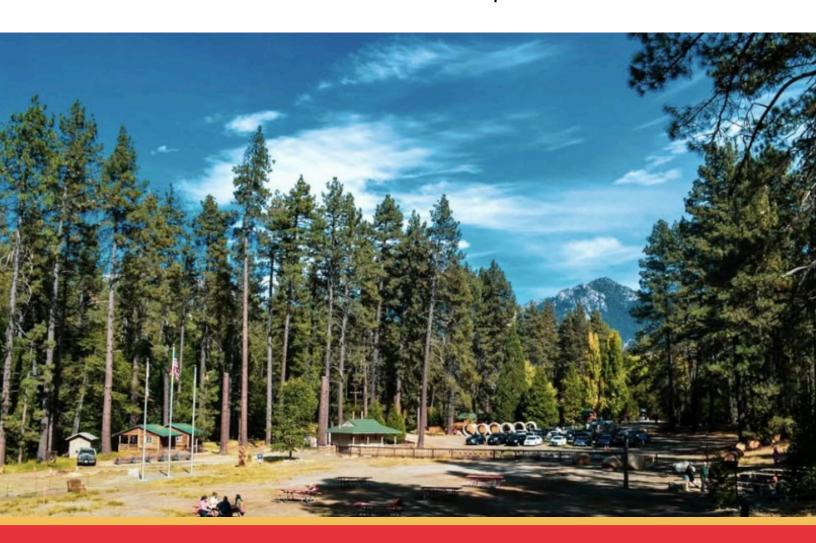
There are a limited number of wagons available to help transport heavier items to campsites. Please return the wagons when finished with them.

## **PARKING**

#### There is NO PARKING IN CAMPSITES.

When you arrive, please park in the lower parking lot, and back into your parking spot. Drivers should always keep their keys on them in case we have to quickly leave camp.

Vehicles are not allowed in the camp!



## **CHECK-OUT**

Check out begins Sunday morning and must be complete by 10:00 AM. Please check out with staff located outside the Trading Post.

Before your final departure staff will check the unit's campsites to ensure that "Leave No Trace" conditions have been met.



## **HEALTH & SAFETY POLICIES**

#### Youth Protection and Unit Leadership

The safety of our youth members is our top priority at Webelos Woods. All Scouts and Leaders are expected to follow the Scout Oath and Law. The California Inland Empire Council, Scouting America strictly adheres to the Scouter's Code of Conduct, as well as all Youth Safeguarding standards and guidelines. These include, but are not limited to:

- 2-deep leadership
- No one-on-one contact
- Use the Buddy System
- Respect of privacy
- Separate accommodations for youth and adults
- Constructive discipline
- Appropriate attire
- No hazing
- No secret organizations
- No bullying

#### Leaders

Scouting America policy requires two adult leaders, one of whom must be at least 21 years of age, to be in camp for the entire weekend. Likewise, there must be a registered female adult leader 21 years of age or over in every unit serving females. All concerns are to be reported to the Webelos Woods Headquarters area at the campground.

#### Restrooms

The Simmons Flats restrooms are designated for youth female and youth males only; use by adults is strictly prohibited. Adults are only to use the restrooms located near the dining hall, the single-use port-a -potties, or the single restrooms near the parking lot.

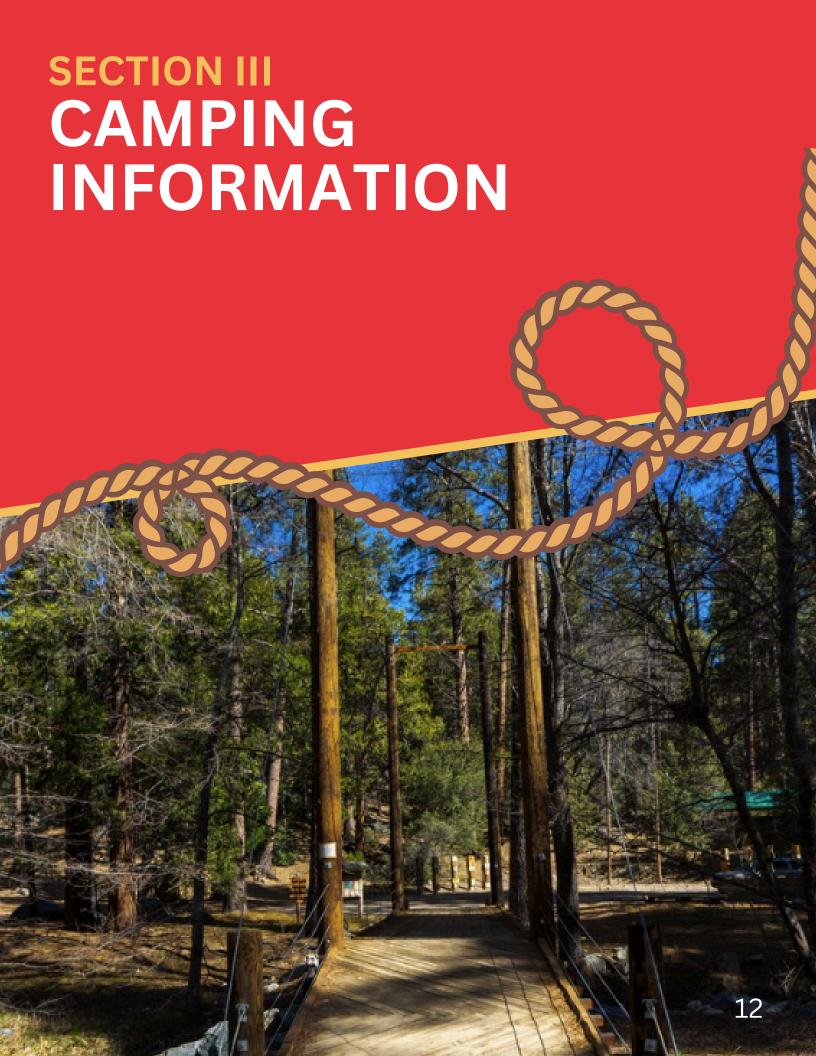
#### Illness and First Aid

First aid treatment is available 24 hours a day at the Camp Emerson headquarters.

#### **Lights Out**

All Scouts, adults, and leaders are expected to be at their campsite for lights out by 10:00 PM.





# GENERAL CAMPING INFORMATION

#### **Camping Gear**

The Scout handbook contains checklists for camping gear. Please review it with all your scouts. Remember that Camp Emerson is at ~5,000 feet and can be much colder than our hometowns. Plan accordingly and check the weather prior to leaving. The event will go on, rain or shine. Be prepared!

#### Cooking

Proper meal planning is the key to reducing waste. At no time is it acceptable to dump leftover food or waste onto the ground, into the creek, or into the sinks or toilets. Each unit will be provided a trash bag for their respective campsite.

Units will plan and prepare their own meals at Webelos Woods. The Scouts should help in the menu planning and to the maximum extent possible, the food preparation as well.

Only Propane stoves are allowed. **Open fires and grilling with charcoal are currently prohibited**.

The kitchen area of your camp should be set up in accordance with the best practices laid out in the Scout Handbook.

- Food must be stored in appropriate containers at all times (plastic totes, tubs with lids, etc.) to avoid unwanted visits from wildlife.
- Units must use the three-pot sanitizing process recommended by the BSA
- No matter how you're cooking, you should have hot water for clean up by the time you're done eating. Begin cleaning up by setting out three pots:
  - 1. Wash pot Contains hot water with a few drops of biodegradable soap.
  - 2. Hot rinse pot Clear, hot water.
  - 3. Cold rinse pot Cold rinse with a sanitizing tablet or a few drops of bleach to kill bacteria.
- NO food is allowed inside tents at any time.

#### **Electricity**

Please note that no on-site electricity is available for Scouts, parents, leaders, and Campers. We cannot accommodate any electrical lighting or medical devices. If you require a medical device that uses electricity, you must provide a battery-type power source.



# GENERAL CAMPING INFORMATION

#### **Fires**

No open fires in the campsites or outside of designated competition activities and under staff supervision. **Cooking will be done using propane stoves or burners.** Charcoal for Dutch Oven cooking will not be allowed. Propane firepits may be used in campsites.

#### Meals

Plan basic menus so food preparation does not consume activities. All participants need to eat before arriving in camp or bring a sack dinner. All meals are planned and prepared by each individual unit, on their own. Units may want to have some granola bars/snacks available to tide the scouts over between meals and until they get home.

#### **Message Board**

Each unit should have a message board within their campsite. Units should bring a whiteboard or some way to display duty rosters, menus, patrol rosters, map of camp, etc.

#### **Sharing Tents**

Webelos/AOLS may co-tent with a parent, or a scout of the same gender. Scouts of opposite genders may not share tents, unless they are siblings.

#### Tents/Gear

Self-standing tents are recommended. Small stakes are permitted, nothing longer than one foot. Safety caps on stakes and flagging on guidelines are strongly encouraged. Tents must be close together. Bring your unit flag, stand, gateway, and banner.

#### Trash

- All units are expected to keep their campsites clean.
- Each unit will be supplied trash bags.
- Separate recyclables (items with CRV glass, aluminum, plastic bottles, and cans from the trash.)
- Put recyclables in large light blue plastic bags. Put trash in large clear or black trash bags.
- Leave enough space at the top of each bag to double-knot the bag's opening.
- If the bag breaks, re-bag and again double-knot it!
- Put ALL bags at the designated campsite trashcan.
- Any miscellaneous items of trash (discarded tents, lawn chairs, boxes, etc.) must be put to one side of the pile of trash bags.



# GENERAL CAMPING INFORMATION

#### **Uniforms**

The uniform for flags and campfire is Field Uniform (Class A). Activity shirts (Class B) may be worn for activities.

#### Water

Dehydration is a big concern at camp. Everyone should bring a water bottle to carry with them on Saturday and Sunday. Additional water will be available throughout the camp for refills.





# CAMPSITE ORGANIZATION & DECORATION COMPETITION

Each sub-camp will have a campsite organization & decoration competition with judging taking place over the weekend and awards for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd given out.

#### **Campsite Decoration Competition**

Some of the items being reviewed for Campsite Decoration Competition:

Scout made & built (separate criteria and considerations will be applied for each sub camp)

- Natural materials
- Best application of Wild West theme
- Festive, Creative & Fun
- Overall appearance
- Flags properly displayed.
- Campsite decorations must be complete by Saturday morning at 8:30am and your campsite ready for campsite inspection after the opening flag ceremony.

#### **Campsite Competition**

Items that will be reviewed in the Campsite Inspection:

#### **SCOUT SPIRIT**

- U.S. Flag (displayed properly)
- Unit Flag (displayed properly
- Patrol/Den Flags displayed

#### **CAMP CLEANLINESS**

- Campsite grounds clean and free of litter
- Kitchen area identified.
- Kitchen area clean and neat
- Dish/Hand washing area clean (all units sharing a site will be responsible)
- Food stored properly, i.e., off the ground, in enclosed containers, away from tents.
- Overall cleanliness, neatness, and organization of campsite and surrounding area

- Tents are set up properly and in an orderly fashion.
- Personal gear stored neatly.

#### **SAFETY**

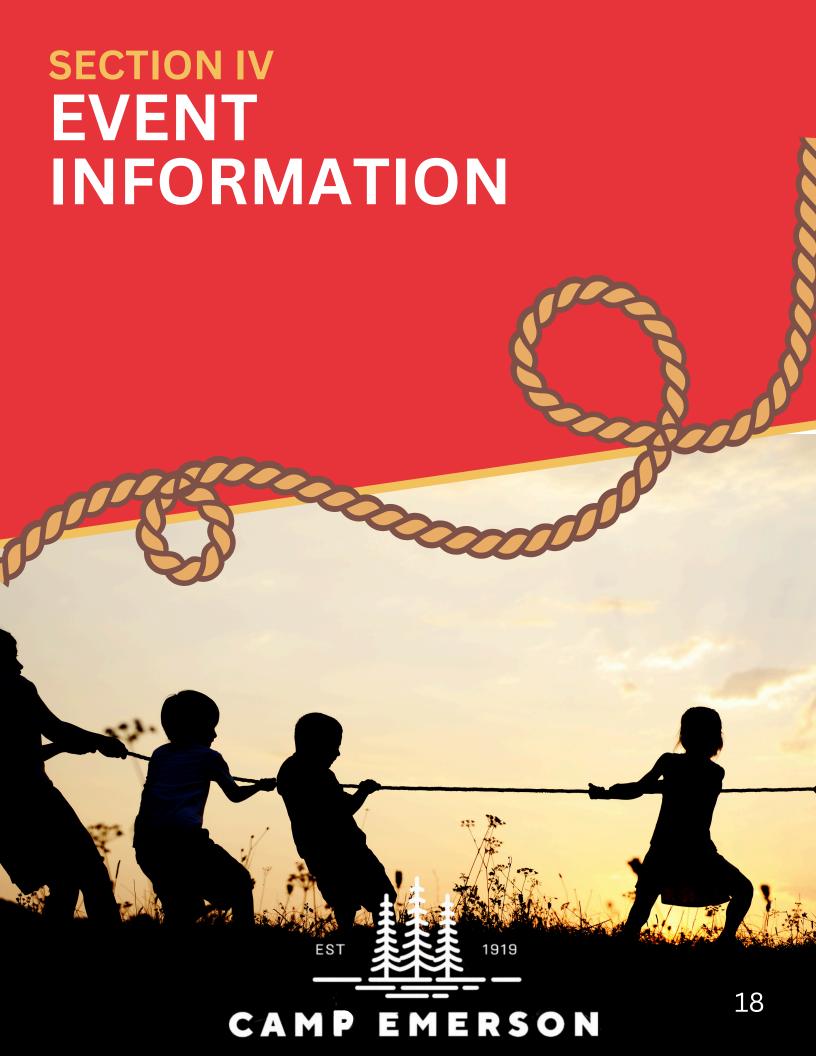
- First Aid kit visible and accessible

#### GENERAL INFORMATION

Units will not be judged by anyone connected with their unit. The judging criteria are designed to be as objective as possible. There will also be points awarded for unit appearance and SPIRIT! No adjustments or changes will be made after final tabulations are completed. All judges scoring decisions are final.

#### **Clans/ Patrols**

Scouts will be placed into "Clans" (patrols) of 7-10 Scouts for this event. Patrols may select famous outlaws or feuding clans from the wild west to represent in their patrol name. We will work with each unit ahead of time to ensure that we do our best to maintain unit integrity and not split Scouts from the same den. The Patrol Positions, Elections & Responsibilities sheet is a good reference for how to best structure your den for Webelos Woods. The included roster should be posted in a visible location in your campsite.

#### **Campsite Inspections and Competitions**

Each sub-camp will have a campsite competition with first, second, and third-place awards, which will judge the campsite as a whole, and the campsite decorations. Interested units should set up their campsite in full by 8:30 am Saturday. Judging criteria is enclosed in the Appendix of Forms: Appendix A. Judging will begin Saturday after the opening ceremonies and awards will be presented during the closing flags.

#### **Closing Ceremonies**

Scouts will participate in an interfaith worship service, followed by campsite and decoration awards, and closing flags. Scouts should attend the closing ceremonies in Class A uniforms.



#### MORNING AND AFTERNOON ACTIVITIES

Morning and afternoon sessions are designed for scouts to rotate through a series of games and activities. Below is a description of the stations your scouts can expect to encounter.

#### **Camping Starter Kit**

At this station scouts will compete in a timed race to setup a campsite according to Scouting America's standard campsite design. This may include setting up a tent, and a properly laid out camp kitchen.

#### Range and Target Activities

At this station, scouts will participate in archery target shooting or other range activities.

#### **Knots Relay**

Scouts will compete in a timed relay to tie a series of knots using the EDGE method, including a square knot, a sheet bend, two half-hitches, a taught line, a clove hitch, a timber hitch and a bowline knot.

#### **Calf Rescue**

In this challenge scouts will practice lassoing a calf.

#### **Scavenger Hunt**

Scouts will complete an orienteering challenge to solve this scavenger hunt.





#### MORNING AND AFTERNOON ACTIVITIES CONT.

#### **Dutch Oven Tripod Challenge**

During this challenge, scouts will construct a tripod to support a Dutch oven via a series of lashings.

#### Rescue Me

Scouts will practice first aid skills in a simulated rescue situation.

#### **Obstacle Course**

In this activity, scouts will navigate through a challenging obstacle course.

#### **Cross-Country Skiing**

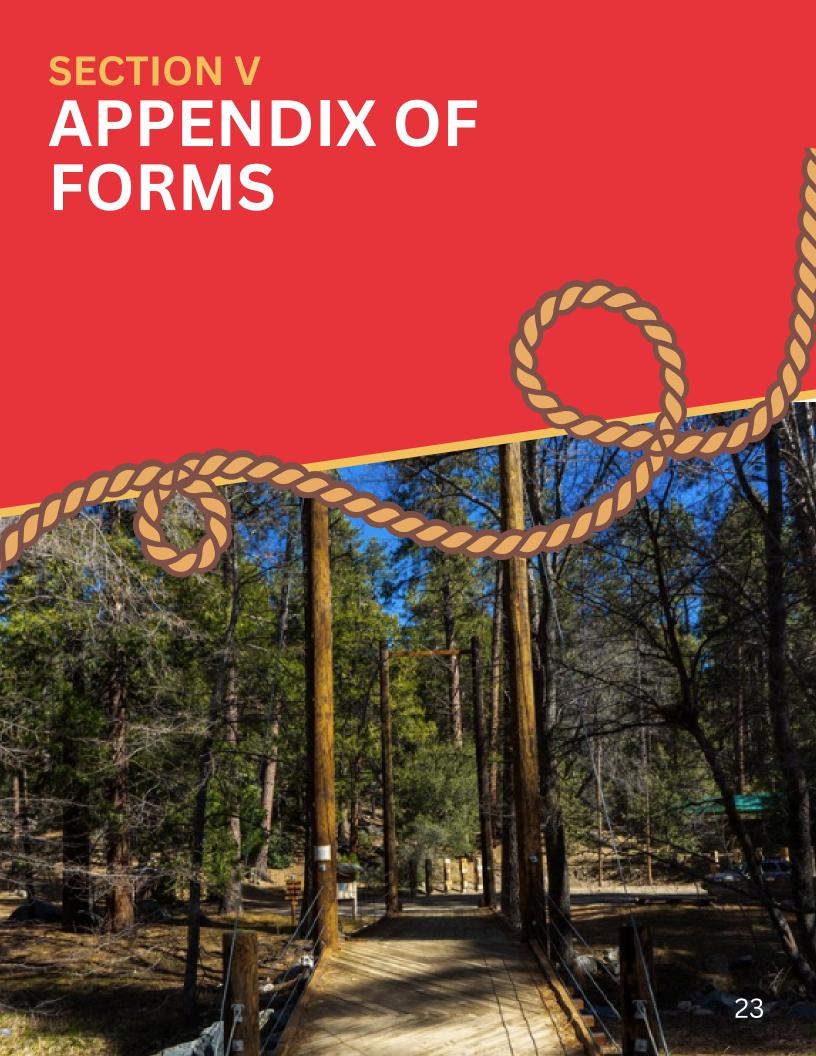
Scouts will demonstrate teamwork as they cooperate to tandem walk with rope-handled wooden skis.

Scouts will practice fire-laying and starting in a timed competition.

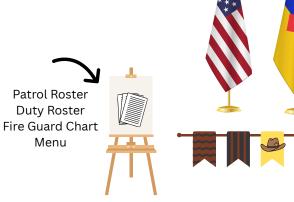
#### **PATROL METHOD SAMPLE CAMPSITE & GATEWAY SETUP**

# PATROL METHOD GUIDELINES & RESPONSIBILITIES SHEET

#### PATROL METHOD: ELECTIONS & TERMS OF SERVICE

"The patrol system is not one method in which Scouting ... can be carried on. It is the only method."

-Lord Baden-Powell, Scouting's founder

Thank you for taking part in our Webelos Woods. This exciting event has physical competitions, campsite competitions, archery, a campfire program, and other Scouting activities and is modeled after a Scout Camporee. Throughout Webelos Woods the Scouts will operate as a Scout patrol and be judged on their ability to carry out the patrol method. With this in mind, we have provided this guide to help you understand what the roles and responsibilities are as well as how the elections can be held. However, we understand that individual units may adopt other methods suitable to their unit.

#### **Patrol Terms of Service**

There are two schools of thought regarding the potential length of service for elected patrol roles while at Webelos Woods, both with their own pros and cons. The first is to have the scouts rotate through the positions throughout the weekend and give each youth a chance at being Patrol Leader.

**Pro**: each youth has the opportunity to be Patrol Leader.

**Con**: None of the youth in the patrol are allowed to serve long enough to make a substantial impact.

The second school of thought is to <u>have the scouts serve in the elected and appointed positions for the entire weekend</u>.

**Pro**: The scouts get to fully experience their positions of responsibility and then evaluate how their role played a part in their patrol's success.

**Con**: Not everyone has the opportunity to serve as Patrol Leader. It will be up to each unit to determine how they will incorporate the patrol method and elections for Webelos Woods.

#### Let Them Lead!

So again, "Train 'em, trust 'em, and let 'em lead!" And remember that that last point is of tremendous importance. Let them lead in practically everything. Let them work out their own problems, interfere as little as possible but be ever ready to give wise guidance-not when you think they need it, but when they seek it. Keep in mind that unwarranted, ill advised interference discourages leadership and that those ... leaders of yours are "learning by doing." (Handbook for Scoutmasters by William "Green Bar Bill" Hillcourt, 1936, pg 225)

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#### PATROL METHOD: ELECTIONS & TERMS OF SERVICE (CONT.)

#### Patrols May Elect Leaders Prior to Coming to Webelos Woods

The patrol(s) should try to convene with their adult advisor(s) prior to arriving at Webelos Woods and will elect one member through secret balloting and majority vote (or other election method acceptable to the unit) to be the Patrol Leader (PL); all patrol members are potential candidates provided they are willing to accept and fulfill the responsibilities of office for the full term. The newly elected PL(s) may then immediately appoint an **Assistant Patrol Leader (APL), Patrol Chaplain Aide, Patrol Fire Warden, Patrol Spiritmaster**, and a **Patrol Quartermaster** for each patrol. Units may also opt to elect all of the roles via ballot, rather than requiring appointment by the PL.

#### **Election Process**

- 1. Review the roles and responsibilities of the office.
- 2. Scouts declare their candidacy for the position of Patrol Leader and explain why they want the job and why they feel they are the best candidate for the position.
- 3. Ballots are distributed.
- 4. Each Scout writes their vote onto the ballot.
- 5. Ballots are collected and tallied
  - a. Elections must be won by a "majority" vote.
  - b.If more than two candidates run for office, and one candidate does not receive a majority vote (>50%) on first balloting, the two candidates who received the highest number of votes will remain on the ballot for a run-off election.
  - c. If the run-off election ends in another tie, a coin toss will decide the tie-breaker.
- 6. The newly elected PL will then immediately appoint an Assistant Patrol Leader (APL), Patrol Chaplain Aide, Patrol Fire Warden, Patrol Spiritmaster, and a Patrol Quartermaster, or the unit may opt to elect these additional roles via ballots.

#### **Appointment Process**

- 1. Review the roles and responsibilities of the office
- 2. Scouts declare their candidacy for; Assistant Patrol Leader (APL), Patrol Chaplain Aide, Patrol Fire Warden, Patrol Spiritmaster, and a Patrol Quartermaster, and explain why they want the job and why they feel they are the best candidate for the position.
- 3. The Patrol Leader appoints the Assistant Patrol Leader (APL), Patrol Chaplain Aide, Patrol Fire Warden, Patrol Spiritmaster, and a Patrol Quartermaster, or the unit may opt to elect these additional roles via ballots.

#### PATROL METHOD: ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES

#### **Patrol Leader**

- Take a leading role in planning and conducting patrol meetings and activities
- Assign additional offices of responsibility within the patrol with the approval of the Leader in Charge
- Encourage patrol members to fully participate and to do their best
- Represent the patrol
- Provide patrol members with all of the resources and information they need to succeed
- Empower the patrol to become the best it can be
- See that the patrol is prepared for all program and activities
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law

#### **Assistant Patrol Leader**

- Assume the responsibilities of the Patrol Leader whenever the Patrol Leader is unable to do so
- Encourage patrol members to fully participate and to do their best
- Assist the Patrol Leader in empowering the patrol to become the best it can be
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law

#### **Patrol Chaplain Aide**

In concert with the chaplain aides of other patrols and with the Leader in Charge who will coordinate their efforts, the patrol chaplain aide will:

- Learn what resources are available that can be used for religious observances
- Assist in conducting religious observances that may arise
- Invocation at morning flag
- Grace before meals
- Benediction at closing flag Interfaith worship service
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law

#### **Patrol Fire Warden**

In concert with the Fire Warden of other patrols and with the Leader in Charge who will coordinate their efforts, the Patrol Fire Warden will:

- Ensure there are no open flames in camp
- Remind all participants to back in their vehicles in the parking lot
- Remind all participants to carry the keys to their vehicle with them at all times
- Ensure that all propane lanterns or devices are extinguished when not attended
- See that the camp area is clean and free of trash and debris
- Ensure the designated trash bin is visible and emptied as needed
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law

#### PATROL METHOD: ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES (CONT.)

#### **Patrol Spiritmaster**

- Encourage patrol members to demonstrate Scout Spirit and good sportsmanship
- Encourage your patrol members to use the camp theme
- Lead your patrol in patrol cheers and yells
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law

#### **Patrol Quartermaster**

In concert with the Quartermaster of other patrols and with the Leader in Charge who will coordinate their efforts, the Quartermaster will:

- Ensure your patrol members have their personal gear neatly arranged and stowed when not in use
- Ensure the pack equipment is neatly arranged and stowed when not in use
- Ensure that washing bins and cooking tools are properly cleaned and stowed when not in use
- Ensure that the patrol First Aid kit is visible and accessible
- See that the patrol has access to drinking water at all times
- Encourage your patrol members to stay hydrated and drink plenty of water
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law

#### **Patrol Members**

For a patrol to succeed as a team, each of its members must:

- Fully participate in Webelos Woods and do his best
- Help the patrol by understanding and using the patrol method while supporting their patrol members
- Be on time and properly uniformed
- Demonstrate Scout Spirit and good sportsmanship
- Incorporate the camp theme in their activities and actions
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law
- Have fun!

# SCOUTING AMERICA SAFETY MOMENT

#### SCOUTING AMERICA SAFETY MOMENT KEEPING YOUR FOOD SAFE

#### Summary

Food-borne illnesses peak during the summer months due to a variety of factors, including warmer temperatures and improper food handling. Keep your meals and your Scouts safe while participating in hikes, campouts, and other outdoor activities with careful menu planning and by following safe food handling practices. Remember the three "C's" to keep your food safe: Keep it COLD, keep it CLEAN, and COOK it thoroughly.

#### General Information

Acute gastroenteritis (medlineplus.gov/gastroenteritis.html) is the most common infectious disease encountered when camping. Symptoms of vomiting, diarrhea, and abdominal cramps may begin to appear hours to days after ingestion.

**Keep it cold:** Bacteria are slow to grow in temperatures below 40 degrees F or above 140 degrees F. The temperature range in between is known as the danger zone where bacteria can multiply rapidly. Since a heat source is usually unavailable to transport foods, it's best to start with perishable foods chilled or frozen, then packed with plenty of ice, frozen gel packs. or frozen juice boxes.

**Keep it clean**: Start with clean hands by utilizing soap and water or disposable wipes before handling food. Wash fruits and vegetables before cutting them on a clean surface. Avoid cross-contamination by never allowing raw meat, poultry, or their juices to come into contact with fresh or prepared foods. Keep all raw and cooked meat. poultry, or fish separate and always wash hands properly after handling. Use only a clean water source to wash hands, dishes, and fresh fruits and vegetables. If water is not available, properly using hand sanitizer with at least 60 percent alcohol can help to reduce the number of microbes in most situations. But hand sanitizer does not eliminate all germs. Correct hand washing remains the best way to prevent illnesses from being transmitted. Also, remember in the backcountry to follow recommended water treatment protocols when rehydrating food, cooking, or drinking.

**Cook it thoroughly:** Many Scouts are cooking on their own for the first time. It can be difficult to determine doneness of meat and poultry as color is not a good indicator Meat can harbor dangerous bacteria. A digital meat thermometer is a good tool to have in the chuck box and to use when cooking meat, poultry, and fish. The references listed below provide safe minimum internal temperatures. Be sure to clean your thermometer between uses.

### IN CASE OF FIRE

**REPORTING AND ASSEMBLY INSTRUCTIONS.** At some camps local changes are made in these suggested procedures. All exceptions, however, should be made on the recommendation and with the approval of local fire authorities.

#### IN A UNIT CAMPSITE

- 1. Sound the alarm by yelling "Fire!" and then notify the first adult you see then report to a camp officer or the camp fire warden.
- 2. Extinguish a fire only if it can be done quickly and easily.
- 3. When the central alarm is sounded to warn the camp, quickly mobilize in your unit. Move to your preassigned point immediately and await directions.
- 4. A runner reports to the camp office for instructions from the camp fire warden.
- 5. In the event of a tent fire, you can douse it with water or sand, or simply stand back and let professionals fight the fire.

#### **OUTSIDE UNIT CAMPSITE**

- 1. If you discover a fire anywhere in camp, report immediately to the camp office so the alarm may be sounded and fire authorities notified.
- 2. Camp fire warden sounds the central alarm, and your unit follows steps 3 and 4 above.
- 3. Remember: Campers should not be directly involved in the fire fighting process except for fires that can be quickly and easily extinguished.

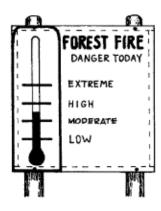

#### **EQUIPMENT**

#### 1. Campfires

- a. Use Two Bucket System for tents/fires b. Have shovel ready at hand.
- 2. Chemical Fires:
  - a. Fire extinguisher suitable for fuel type.
  - b. Proper chemical storage is used.

#### FLAMMABILITY WARNING

NO TENT MATERIAL IS FIREPROOF, AND IT CAN BURN WHEN EXPOSED TO HEAT OR FIRE.

#### **FOLLOW THESE CAMPING SAFETY RULES:**

- Only flashlights and battery-powered lanterns are permitted in tents. NO FLAMES IN TENTS is a rule that must be enforced.
- Stoves, heaters, lanterns, lighted candles, matches, or other flame sources should never be used in or near tents.
- Do not pitch tents near open fire.
- Do not use flammable/combustible chemicals near tents or open flames:
  - hand sanitizer, bug killer, or repellent, or spray cans of paint, deodorant, or hair spray.
- Use ground-fault circuit-interrupter (GCFI) when using outlets or extension cords to supply electrical power to tents.
- Always extinguish cooking and campfires properly.
- Obey all fire laws, ordinances, and regulations.
- Keep campers informed on a daily basis of your camp's fire danger.

#### **UNIT EVACUATION PLAN**

Upon arrival to a camping location, units should identify a location in the immediate area to evacuate to in case of fire, and post the designated location on the Unit Fireguard Chart.

If the fire is wide-spread and necessitates leaving the camping location, units should utilize precautions, such as keeping vehicles in ready-to-go status, and carrying vehicle keys on their person.

# POLICY ON THE STORAGE, HANDLING AND USE OF CHEMICAL FUELS AND EQUIPMENT

#### **PURPOSE**

This policy directs Scouting America members how to safely store, handle, and use chemical fuels and equipment. Safety and environmental awareness concerns have persuaded many campers to move away from traditional outdoor campfires in favor of chemical-fueled equipment for cooking, heating, and lighting. Be aware that chemical fuels and equipment create very different hazards than traditional wood, charcoal, and other solid fuels; this policy defines how to address those hazards.

Before any chemical fuels or chemical-fueled equipment is used, an adult knowledgeable about chemical fuels and equipment, including regulatory requirements, should resolve any hazards not specifically addressed within this policy.

#### **DEFINITIONS**

Chemical Fuels-- liquid, gaseous, or gelled fuels.

**Approved Chemical-Fueled Equipment**-Commercially manufactured equipment, including stoves, grills, burners, heaters, and lanterns, that are designed to be used with chemical fuels.

Prohibited Chemical-Fueled Equipment-Equipment that is handcrafted, homemade, modified, or installed beyond the manufacturer's stated design limitations or use. Examples include alcohol-burning "can" stoves, smudge pots, improperly installed heaters, and propane burners with their regulators removed.

#### Recommended Chemical Fuels-

White gas (Coleman fuel); kerosene; liquified petroleum gas fuels, including propane, butane, and isobutane; vegetable oil fuels; biodiesel fuel; and commercially prepared gelled-alcohol in original container.

#### Chemical Fuels not Recommended-

Unleaded gasoline, liquid alcohol fuels, including isopropyl alcohol, denatured ethyl alcohol, and ethanol; and other flammable chemicals that are not in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions for chemical-fueled equipment.

# STORING, HANDLING, AND USING CHEMICAL FUELS AND EQUIPMENT

- An adult knowledgeable about chemical fuels and equipment should always supervise youth involved in the storage, handling, and use of chemical fuels and equipment.
- Operate and maintain chemical-fueled equipment according to the manufacturer's instructions and in facilities or areas only where and when permitted.
- Using liquid fuels for starting any type of fire --including lighting damp wood, charcoal, and ceremonial campfires or displays-- is prohibited.
- No flames in tents. This includes burning any solid, liquid, gel, or gas fuel; including tents or teepees that feature or support stoves or fires; and any chemical-fueled equipment or catalytic heaters.
- Store chemical fuels in their original containers or in containers designed for immediate use. Securely store any spare fuel away from sources of ignition, buildings, and tents.
- During transport and storage, properly secure chemical fuel containers in an upright, vertical, position.



#### HOW YOUR UNIT FIREGUARD PLAN WORKS

#### **DUTIES**

When you arrived at camp, you were oriented and trained in the use of the unit fireguard plan. It is your responsibility as a unit leader to train your Scouts in fire prevention, fire detection, reporting, and fire control. Only implement fire control techniques that can be done quickly and easily.

Study the procedures outlined on this chart and then train your staff and youth members. Post the chart for all to see and follow. At some camps local changes are made in these suggested procedures. All exceptions, however, should be made on the written recommendation and with the approval of local fire authorities.

Organize to make the fireguard plan work by appointing capable fire wardens and deputies.

#### FIRE WARDENS AND DEPUTIES

The unit leader for each campsite assigns a unit fire warden and deputy, who may serve for the entire camp session or alternate with others. For cub Scout camps, these should be adults. Youth leaders fill those functions at Scouts BSA and Venturing camps under adult supervision.

Everyone in the unit should feel responsible for fire prevention, but additional personnel may be assigned daily to assist the unit fire warden and deputy during a fire emergency or drill with accounting for everyone in the unit an conducting an evacuation. In Cub Scout camps, parents and/or den chiefs may be assigned to help. For Scouts BSA camps, patrol leaders are logical choices. For small treks, the entire crew may be made responsible.

The unit fire warden and deputy:

- Train all unit members in the fireguard plan
- Know where all fire equipment is located
- Complete this unit fireguard chart
- Verify that all cooking, heating, and campfires are completely out when not attended
- Conduct a fire drill once a week at the direction of the camp fire warden
- Report any fire hazards to the camp fire warden, immediately
- Are ready to evacuate and account for everyone in the event of an emergency
- Check fire extinguishers, smoke detectors, and carbon monoxide detectors if the unit sleeps in cabins

If a small fire breaks out, the person discovering it should take immediate action, whether or not they are on the fire patrol for the day. Time is the most important element in the suppression of a fire. Some examples of fire control techniques are:

- Immediately send someone to seek assistance, send a runner for help, and/or dial the camp office or 911.
- Douse fire with water or sand.
- Smother fire with a lid.
- In the event of a canvas tent fire, simply kick out the end tent poles if it can be done safely.

#### Remember: Campers should not be involved in fire fighting

In making daily inspections of the unit campsite, the unit fire warden should follow the fire-prevention suggestions and use the fire-fighting equipment illustrations found throughout this chart as a guide. Campsite equipment will vary according to your camp. Results of the daily inspection should be posted on the chart in the space provided.

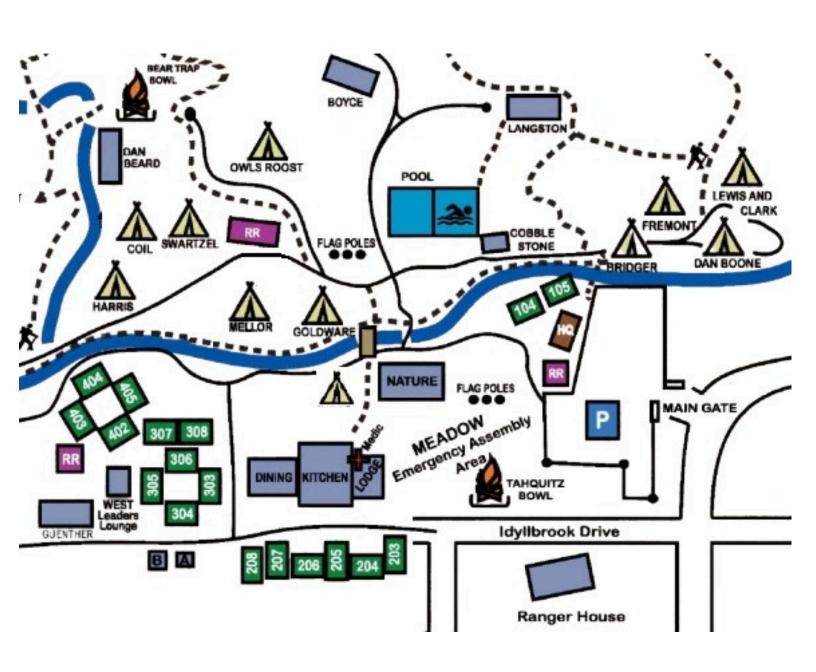
