Overview

The purpose of the National Outdoor Adventure Summit is to provide a forum for professional and volunteer Scouters who are responsible for outdoor programming to learn about new programs and techniques that can help them expand their local council outdoor programs. Participants will receive ideas for facilities, equipment, programs, management, and marketing designed to increase youth and adult participation in camping and outdoor programs for Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Varsity Scouts, and Venturers.

Registration

Register early! The registration fee for the 2009 National Outdoor Adventure Summit is \$460. A discounted early bird fee of \$395 is available until midnight September 15, 2009. The full registration of \$460 becomes effective at 12:01 A.M. on September 16.

The fee includes four nights lodging (October 14–17) in a dormitory or duplex with up to four people per room, meals, conference polo shirt, and conference supplies. Sheets, blankets, pillows, and towels are provided.

Conference-Only Package. The fee for participants choosing to stay off-site is \$360. A discounted early bird fee of \$295 is available until midnight September 15, 2009. The full registration of \$360 becomes effective at 12:01 A.M. on September 16.

The conference-only fee includes all meals, conference polo shirt, and conference supplies. Visit *www.cimarronnm.com* for local lodging options.

Limited sites are available for recreational vehicles. Hookups are not available. If you plan to stay in an RV, select the conference-only package.

A \$100 cancellation fee will apply if reservations are cancelled after October 1, 2009.

Michael is a former Cub Scout, Boy Scout, and den chief; his parents were Scout leaders; and he has served as the adult leader presenter at the National Order of the Arrow Conference. Michael wrote and presented three Emmy® Award– winning television programs on

communicating with young people. He is a frequent national keynote speaker for youth-serving organizations, including the American Camp Association and the National Recreation and Park Association. Michael has served on the national board of directors and executive committee of the ACA and has received two national honors from ACA for his training of directors and staff throughout the world.

Michael Martin Murphey, the "singing cowboy poet," is not only the No. 1, bestselling singer/songwriter of American cowboy music, he's one of the world's most respected singer/songwriters in the pop and country-western field. Though he's remained a lifetime resident and loyal son of Texas, he's a man on a mystical,



spiritual quest to try to capture the soul of the deserts, plains, and mountains in the soul of America—from the Carolinas to California, from the Great Plains to the Deep South to the Wild North Country.

Michael is the world's most prominent musical representative of the Western horseman (Legendary Hollywood stunt man and Western actor Richard Farnsworth once called him a "master horseman."), horse rancher, cattle rancher, and cowboy. He's also a lover of the outdoors, with a strong commitment to issues regarding farmers and ranchers, open space, and management of natural resources.

Although Michael did have some love song-related hits, most of his own work involves nature and his respect for all things living and the universe at large. And let's not forget that his biggest hit, "Wildfire," was about a mysterious dream horse on the vast American heartland prairie. While others sang about the urban street life and hip discos, Michael was singing about the stark beauty of the "dark, flat land" of Nebraska. Murphey has also received awards for his accomplishments in many fields. The award for which he is most honored is the Golden Smoky Award, given to him by the Department of Interior for his tireless work in conservation and wildlands fire awareness.

Climate

October in New Mexico offers crisp nights and warm days. An early season snowfall is not out of the question, but is rare. Bring layered clothing that will allow you to adjust for daytime temperatures in the 60s and nighttime temperatures in the 20s.

Transportation

Philmont Scout Ranch is located near Cimarron in northeastern New Mexico. Major airports serving the region are located in Albuquerque (220 miles), Colorado Springs (190 miles), and Denver (270 miles).

Ride Share

Carpools are recommended, and a special ride-share community will be activated on *My Scouting* to facilitate carpooling from major airports to the summit. Check the "Ride Share" button when you register, and you will be added to the community. Members of the community can post their travel information to facilitate sharing rental cars with other participants.

Certified Angler Instructor Course

One of the newest activity awards for Boy Scouts and Venturers is the Certified Angler Award. Youth who have earned the Fishing and Fly Fishing merit badges, or two of the three Fishing sections of the Ranger Award, can test their expertise in angling skills online. Upon satisfactory competition, they will earn the Certified Angler Award, which includes a patch and certificate sanctioned by the International Game Fish Association.

Every council will need instructors for the Certified Angler Awards and the angling merit badges, and we have developed a program to qualify instructors as Certified Angler Instructors for the purpose of teaching fishing and fly-fishing as well as helping instruct Powder Horn, summer camp, Cub Scout day camps, University of Scouting events, camporees, etc. We will be calling on CAIs for national events like the national Scout jamboree and National Order of the Arrow Conference. We urge you to join the ranks of CAIs.

We will be offering a one-day pre-conference session at Philmont on Wednesday, October 14. Participants must arrive on Tuesday, October 13. Participants must demonstrate their ability to teach fishing and fly-fishing skills to Scouts. Instruction will include hands-on practice, instruction, and an exam. Competition will earn participants a special Certified Angler Instructor patch and certificate from IGFA. The fee is \$40, which includes early arrival, lodging, and meals.

The facilitators for the summit are leading professionals, volunteers, and consultants who have been carefully selected based on their expertise.

Schedule Overview

Friday, October 16

Explore Philmont Adventures. An array of exciting and informative options is available on Friday, October 16, to see and experience Philmont and New Mexico. Most are half-day trips that offer participants a variety of options. Select your activities when you complete your registration form.

Recreational Activities

Several interesting and informative recreational activities are available on Friday, October, 16. Some are daylong adventures, and others are shorter and allow time for visiting local museums or sightseeing. Be sure to select an activity when you register online.

Lovers Leap Hike. The Lovers Leap hike is about 2.5 miles round-trip with a gradual incline. Great views of the Tooth of Time can be appreciated along the trail. Wildlife can often be seen during this trek. The trail ends on a breathtaking rock outcrop several hundred feet above the land below.

T-Rex Hike. The T-Rex hike is about 2 miles round-trip along a gentle trail. See the world's only known Tyrannosaurus Rex footprint, along with a number of other dinosaur prints. While traveling to the trailhead, hikers pass through historic Chase Ranch, which was established in the mid-1800s and is the location where New Mexico Territorial Governor Lew Wallace wrote the book *Ben Hur*. **Fly-Fishing.** Those interested in fishing for trout along the Rayado Creek will enjoy fishing like Waite Phillips did and imagining that they are experiencing life like the movie "A River Runs Through It." Instruction will be available for those who have never attempted fly-fishing. Equipment will be provided, or bring your own. Licenses may be purchased at the Tooth of Time Traders.

Horseback Riding. Horses have played an important part in Western life. The trail ride will leave historic cattle headquarters and take a loop ride with great views of the Tooth of Time. Riders will learn about the cattle operations of New Mexico and the life of the cowboy. A maximum 200-pound limit for riders is required. Philmont's burro program will also be highlighted during the ride.

Base Camp Tour. Each day during the summer, 400 campers arrive and 400 campers depart. This tour will take a look behind the scenes to discover how the Philmont operation works. Participants will learn about safety, equipment, and trek planning.

Maintenance Tour. The Maintenance Department for Philmont Scout Ranch is responsible for the infrastructure that includes the care of nearly 600 roofed structures, water systems, and extensive solar operations as well as maintenance of a vehicle fleet, an intensive conservation program, and fire suppressions. Participants will be able to ask questions of our experts as they wander through the shops and learn about some interesting operational procedures that support the Philmont operation.

Villa Tour. In 1927, Waite and Genevieve Phillips completed their Villa Philmonte. They enjoyed this summer home for 14 years until gifting it to the Boy Scouts of America in 1941. During the 1960s, the Villa was restored to the way it looked when the Phillipses owned it. The tour affords an opportunity to get to know this extraordinary family and learn about their association with the Boy Scouts of America.

Backcountry Tours. Several driving tours will be available in Philmont's backcountry, allowing participants to experience several backcountry camps and view the breathtaking scenery of the ranch. The tour guide will share information about the history of the ranch and the operation that supports more than 22,000 trekkers each summer.

Sporting Clays Tournament. Many councils are conducting sporting clays tournaments for fund-raisers with great success. Join us at the NRA Whittington Center in Raton, New Mexico, for this "just for fun" tournament. Prizes will be awarded. The cost is \$25 for ammunition and targets. Shotguns are provided. Be sure to sign up for this option when you register.
